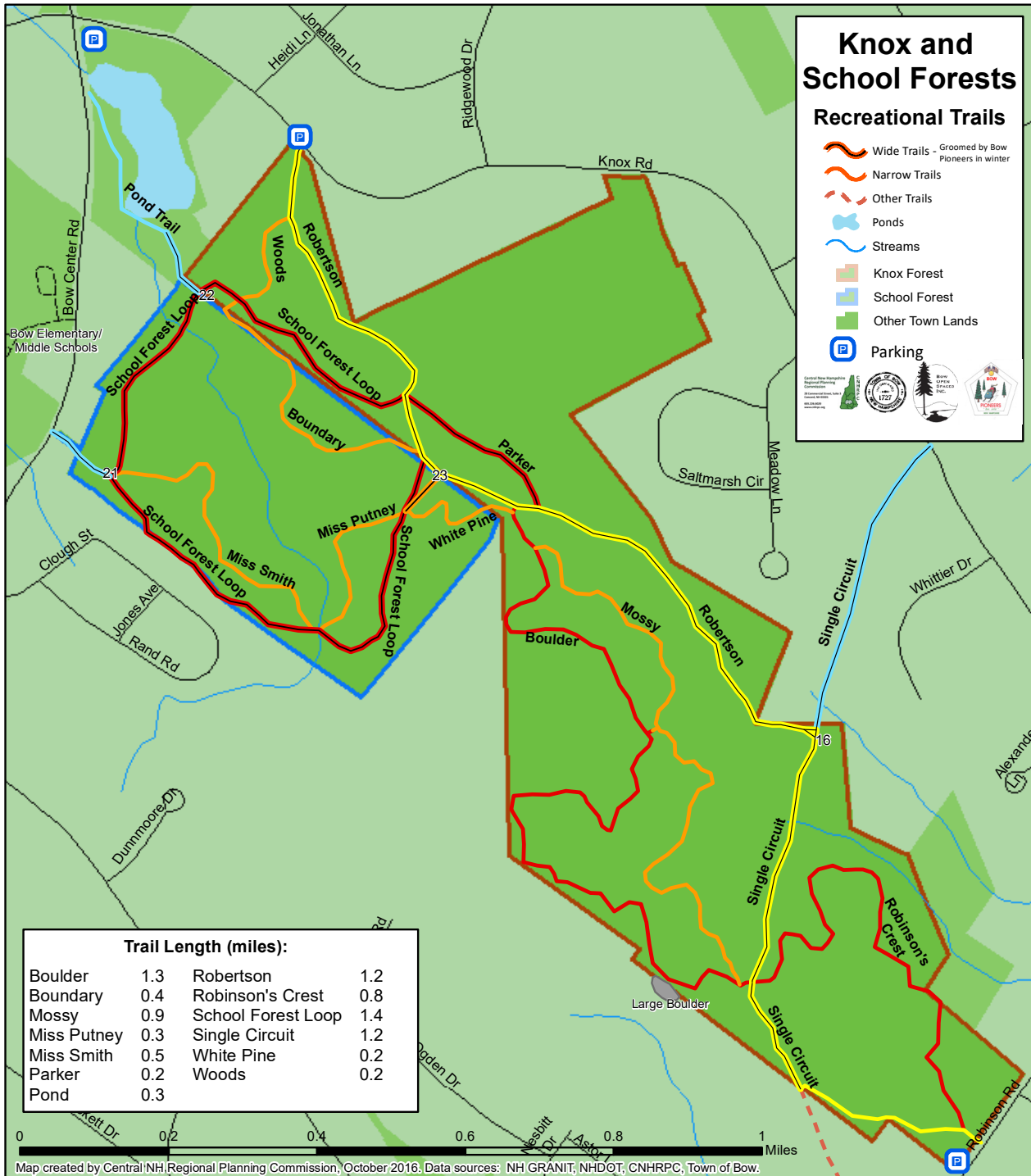
The 318-acre Knox Forest is the second largest town forest in Bow. It is part of three watersheds and has several vernal pools and wetlands scattered throughout. It was part of 1,000 acres purchased by the town from the estate of Robert and Martha Upton at the 1976 Town Meeting. The town granted Bow Open Spaces, Inc. a conservation easement on the land in 1998. The 105-acre School Forest abuts the Knox Forest.

Bow Open Spaces was formed in 1997 to create a local organization that could hold conservation easements and make sure the terms of the easements are followed into the future. Our mission is to acquire, conserve, and manage land within and surrounding the Town of Bow to preserve and protect wildlife habitat, farm land, forests, wetlands and other lands of conservation value. This allows the natural, scenic, recreational, ecological and productive features of such land to be enjoyed by the citizens of Bow and New Hampshire.

## For the enjoyment of all please observe the following:

- Leave no trace. Please “carry in, carry out.” This includes removing pet waste from the trail.
- Dogs are welcome and must be in compliance with all state and town laws (see NH RSA chapter 466).
- Mountain bicyclists: follow the International Mountain Bicycling Association’s Rules of the Trail. Ride within your limits, yield to other trail users and let fellow trail users know you’re coming.
- Stay on existing trails. Do not create new trails without permission.
- Respect trail and road closures. Do not trespass on private land.
- Wet trails are easily damaged - consider a different route when it’s muddy.
- Snowmobiles and horses are allowed on wide trails only.
- Wheeled motorized vehicles are not permitted (except OPDMDs).
